

#### Linda Soley-Reed A few words by Joan Cochran Sommers

I am not quite sure when I actually met Linda the very first time, but she played in the wonderful accordion ensembles that Rudy Molinaro taught back in the 1950s and '60s. The American Accordionists Association Festivals each summer drew many of us from all over the USA to attend with our students in competitions, to take part as adjudicators, or as conductors of orchestras. Some of us performed on various AAA Concerts or the concerts sponsored by several of the accordion companies or distributors. As a young accordionist Linda was undoubtedly competing as a soloist and as a member of a group. My point is that even if we were not introduced to each other, we were around these great accordion events happening during those years.

But Linda later became extremely active in the AAA as an adult and we certainly became friends during those events, such as the one held in Nashville, TN one summer when I was conducting the Festival Accordion Orchestra. After all the scheduled events for the day and evening were over, there was always a get-together in the hotel for all of us to have a drink, some refreshments and lots of animated conversation. And Linda seemed always to be in stocking feet, since she probably had been on hers for many hours before this began. Linda always knew everyone by their first and last name, where they lived, what they were doing, whether teaching or selling the accordion. So if anyone ever needed to be introduced Linda could do it and could make everyone, new or old, feel welcome and accepted; it was just one of her many good traits which always endeared her to everyone!

In October of 2006, the 59th Coupe Mondiale was held in Asker, Norway. As usual, Faithe Deffner was there. I was there, too, both as an adjudicator and as the teacher of a young accordionists representing the ATG. But this year Linda was also there. Well, one day, as usual, I got up quite early, had a quick breakfast, and walked to the Competition site, where I was adjudicating all day and where all of us would be together that evening for one of the big Competitions/Concerts of the event. Faithe had driven to the event since she normally would rent a car if it might be useful. After the concert was over, she brought the car around and Linda and I jumped in with her. Now the fun began! We were just a bit over 2 blocks away from the hotel, but it was dark, rainy, and somewhat dismal outside so it was great to be in this big car! There were many street signs, and even a nice shopping center, plus train tracks coming in from the area where airline passengers could get on and go to their desired destinations around the city. In other words, it was a busy place even at night and especially so after a big concert with lots of attendees walking around outside, so a driver had to be careful to watch what was happening and where to turn and whether the street was one way to the left or to the right or had a no turn sign! It was a bit confusing to say the least, especially shall we say for an American who was not familiar with the area. But Faithe did what she thought was correct. Well, it was the wrong choice and after a few more incorrect turns we ended up somewhere in a dark area where we had to stop and assess where we were. We could see the lights of the hotel where we wanted to go, but there were certainly no streets that we could see which would lead us there. By this time, both Linda and I were beginning to laugh a little and making a few remarks of assurance to Faithe that everything would be just fine...and then we would laugh a little louder and with less assurance probably that our driver knew what in heck to do to get us to that hotel. Finally, with all three of us making jokes about this silly circumstance in which we were involved, somehow, someway, and in spite of everything, we eventually arrived at the hotel where Faithe most assuredly drove us right up to the front door! After taking this grand tour of the one-way streets leading us nowhere, but with a bit of luck and a lot of jollity and enthusiasm, we finally arrived at our destination where our friends who had attended the concert with us had already arrived after walking in the chilled misty rain of the evening. They had walked faster than we had ridden; however, I can tell you they did not have all the wonderful laughs that Linda, Faithe and I had just shared on our short journey!

Linda may also recall this evening since she certainly added a few choice one-liners of (significant?) encouragement to Faithe. She, Faithe and I had a great time that night in Asker, Norway. It was fun! In fact, there is always some fun going on when Linda is in charge; that is one of the reasons we like to be around her.

In 2007 the AAA and the ATG shared the sponsorship of the Coupe Mondiale in Alexandria, VA. Faithe Deffner acted as chair and Linda and I represented the two organizations on the details involved. We talked almost daily for many weeks and wrote innumerable emails to each other. Faithe was a taskmaster and the two of us really had to stick together sometimes to keep our sanity in control. I can tell you Linda was fantastic; she kept track of everything she needed to know and do. Just as she has always welcomed everyone with that glorious Festival Program book she has edited for so many years, she did the same in 2007 for both the AAA and the ATG, but this time including the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes. It was a great success and Linda contributed to that in so many ways; it is impossible to enumerate all of them.

Thank you, Linda, for the stellar work you have done on behalf of all accordion organizations over so many years. I appreciate your friendship so much, just as many others do. You know how to get things done! You represent the very best of those accordionists who "grew up" in the AAA Festivals but have remained long afterwards to assist in making the organization one of the most outstanding in the world with much of it due to your expertise and assistance wherever and whenever needed. You are a blessing and we love you!



A few years later, Linda was again instrumental in convincing me that I should perform as a soloist, produce my CDs, and even appear as a Guest Artist at AAA events. "Always, with MY best interests at heart, you convinced me to take Chairmanship of the Festival and have a stronger voice at the Board meetings, and finally fulfilling a childhood dream ... serving as President of AAA.



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# From Ben Armentano

I started playing the accordion at age 8, first taking lessons with my father, who was a professional accordionist, musician and teacher. After a couple of years, when it became obvious that I wasn't listening to him anymore (lol!), my dad had me study with another teacher, a man named Paul Scalora, who was an excellent teacher with roots in both classical music and jazz, which was important to me because, by my early teens, I had developed a strong love for jazz and pop music.

During those years, I was enrolled in all the Accordion Teachers' Association of CT's contests and actually did pretty well, winning several trophies during those years. At one of the competitions, I attended a concert they were having and I heard something that changed my life forever — the Molinaro School of Music's Accordion Orchestra performing "Fiddle Faddle", conducted by Linda Soley. I was absolutely blown away by the sheer power and virtuosity of the players in this mighty accordion orchestra, and I knew that I wanted to be a part of something like this. So, I asked my dad how I could go about becoming a member of this ensemble, and he knew the only way was to take lessons at the Molinaro School of Music. The next thing I knew, my parents and I were in the car on a Sunday morning, making the hour long drive from Newington, CT to Bridgeport, CT to study with Linda Soley, the woman who was conducting the Molinaro School of Music's accordion orchestra.

From my very first lesson with Linda, I knew things were going to be very different from what I had previously been accustomed to. Linda was a brilliant musician who paid a great deal of attention to detail in music. If a whole note was written in the music, she made sure I held the note for a full four beats, not three and a half. If the music called for notes to be played staccato, she made sure I played it staccato. She made me work very hard on scales and technique. She also pushed me very hard on sight reading, which is something I wasn't very good at and still to this day am not GREAT at, but it only took me about thirty years to finally understand WHY she pushed me so hard on this. I truly believe that Linda saw that I seemed to have a talent for playing jazz and pop music, and that someday I might be able to have a career as a studio musician, if I could sight read well — I just wished it hadn't taken me thirty years to realize this! LOL! She also saw that I had a strong interest in composing and arranging, and even was nice enough to allow me to write an arrangement of composer Jimmy Webb's "MacArthur Park" for the accordion orchestra, which later performed the song at an ATAC concert performance. We won first place in the competition, and Linda was nice enough to give ME the trophy to keep!

Linda has a wonderful sense of humor and, while we had many many, many laughs during my lessons, there were lots and lots of times during my lessons that she became very angry with me because I hadn't practiced or kept on playing the same passage wrong, over and over. I remember working on the first six measures of some classical pies for two solid months until Linda was happy with the way I played it! But that's what made Linda such an incredible teacher — her absolute unwillingness to settle for the music that we were working on to just "good enough" — it had to be PERFECT, or as close to perfect as possible! And that is what made Linda such a great teacher!

So, in closing, let me say this: Linda Soley Reed was the best teacher I have ever had. I would not be the musician I am today if it wasn't for Linda. I have been teaching piano for over forty years now, and there are SO many times when I'm teaching a student that I ask myself, "How would Linda handle this student?" or, "What would Linda have this student work on to make this better?" And one final note to illustrate what a wonderful PERSON Linda is: a little over a year ago, I was having severe financial problems and was looking for a new job. Linda reached out to me and wrote a brand new resume for me and put me in touch with a couple of people that she felt might be able to help me out further. And that's the kind of person Linda is.




Linda Soley: mentor, teacher, friend.
